#### Dear Friends

We are pilgrims on a journey and companions on the road;

We are here to help each other walk the mile and bear the load."

So says Richard Gillard in his hymn 'Brother, Sister, let me serve you"

It's a very apt image for a Christian faith community as early followers of Christ belonged to 'The Way" (Acts ch 9 v2) before being called Christians (Acts ch 11 v 26).

During Lent we consider what it might mean to follow Christ; to be companions on the road, helping each other, through the physical journey of life and the inner journey of faith.

Some choose to do this by venturing on a pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela (where reportedly James, one of the sons of Zebedee, is buried).

As you'll read elsewhere, this Lent we're looking at the journey of faith by following the story of Tom whose son Daniel dies in a storm while walking the Camino to Santiago. Tom sets out to walk the Camino himself, carrying Daniel's ashes, to fulfil his son's goal but becomes aware of his own need of healing and restoration.

He also discovers he cannot make the journey alone and meets 3 companions, each with their own burdens.

Together they reach their goal and "characters not knowingly on a journey to find God are found by God" (Rt Revd Nicholas Holtam, Bishop of Salisbury).

May that be so for us.

In this time of conversation and discussion about 'what is to be done' may we make our prayer that of St Columba:

Be a bright flame before me, O God

a guiding star above me.

Be a smooth path below me,

a kindly shepherd behind me

today, tonight, and for ever.

Alone with none but you, my God

I journey on my way;

what need I fear when you are near.

O Lord of night and day?

More secure am I within your hand

than if a multitude did round me stand. Amen.

A second summit between President Trump and North Korean leader, Kim Jong-un, in Vietnam came to an abrupt halt on Thursday 28 February. Many things remain uncertain - but, like last time, North Korea's horrendous human rights abuses seem to have been left off the agenda.

Last year's summit between Kim Jong-un and President Trump in Singapore did little to raise the atrocious human rights abuses of North Korea. Though President Trump declared that he raised it in private, the treatment of North Korea's 25 million citizens was left out of the official talks. It is possible that President Trump will again raise human rights in private to please evangelical voters in the USA. But whether this is an earnest discussion or a passing remark will likely never been known.

If Christians are discovered, they are deported to labour camps as political criminals or killed on the spot; their families share their fate. With an estimated 50,000 - 70,000 Christians held in prison camps simply because of their Christians faith, Open Doors' CEO, Henrietta Blyth, has called for a discussion into the human rights record of North Korea at the summit in Vietnam: "The conditions in which Christians in North Korea are forced to live are appalling and inexcusable. Human rights abuses must be raised and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights upheld.

# Abridged Statement of the safety elements present within the building at Washingborough Methodist Church,

#### Fire:-

The building is protected by a fire/smoke alarm system. Instructions for 'what to do in the event of a fire' are posted in each room in the building, indicating routes out of the building, safety protocol and the safest route from that room to the fire assembly point in the car park. Fire alarm points:-

If you discover a fire and the fire alarm is not sounding, there are three alarm points where you can sound the alarm to alert others as you leave the building. One alarm by each of the fire exits. (The main exit onto the street, the emergency exit behind the blue curtains in the chapel and the rear exit to the car park – please familiarise yourself.)

#### **Fire Extinguishers**

There are two fire extinguishers in the passage to the right of the entrance to the chapel (one is specifically for electrical fires), there is a further extinguisher to the left of the blue curtains (emergency exit) in the chapel, an extinguisher by the rear door to the carpark and one in the kitchen. There is also a fire blanket in the kitchen.

#### **Emergency Lighting**

Emergency lighting switches on automatically in the event of a power outage.

#### Wheelchair/ Disabled Access

The main doors facing onto the road are suitable for wheelchair and disabled access, as are the emergency exit doors behind the blue curtains in the chapel. (for emergency exit only). The rear door from the car park is not suitable for wheelchair access.

#### Movement of Furniture within the building

Trolleys are available to move tables and chairs around the building. The trolleys, together with any spare tables, are kept in the store room behind the double grey doors in the hall area. Please make use of the trolleys.

#### Accessing high shelving, notice boards etc.

Two sets of sturdy steps are available for accessing higher areas. These are also available from the store room. *Please use the steps*.

#### Safety of Electrical Equipment

Information on using the electrical kitchen equipment is clearly posted in the kitchen area. All plug sockets throughout the building are fitted with safety caps when not in use for electrical equipment. (Please ensure that these safety caps are put back over the plug holes when they are no longer in use.)

#### First Aid Equipment

A first aid box is available from the kitchen. There is also a book for recording any accidents within the building which require any treatment. Both the first aid box and the book are on a shelf on the left as you enter the kitchen.

#### Gas Cut off valves, water stop cocks & circuit breakers.

There is a diagram displayed on the notice board adjacent to the rear entrance indicating the position of these items.

(Please make yourself aware of the position of these items by studying the diagram on the notice board.)
